The seal season is over for another year. Congratulations to all who made it safely.

Sunday night July 20, the longest and most expensive race in the history of man ended with "A small step for man and a giant step for mankind." With these words Neil Armstrong became the first man to set foot on the moon ending the moon race.

Monday morning July 21 the great debate began; "What did we gain?" "Was it worth the billions of dollars spent on it?" "Did it really enhance our prestige?" "Can we justify the loss of four lives in the line of duty?"

These questions will only be answered with the passing of time. Scientists will have to study the rock samples brought back to earth. Readings will have to be made from the instruments left on the surface of the moon. Pictures will have to be developed and analyzed, and the astronauts own visual observations will have to be scrutinized. After all of this is done we will have a partial picture of what has been achieved, but the complete picture will not be realized until future flights are made.

In one way however the mission proved to be a success at once. When Neil Armstrong took his first ginger step on the moon we were standing in the San Francisco Airport with several hundred other people watching a bank of televisions. The crowd was mixture of nationalities, races, political ideas and ages, but for one minute we were all joined with a sense of hope, pride, and wonder at the event that was happening so many miles away. During this short minute black and white stood side by side, forgetting the troubles and grief of the time. A naval captain, a hippy and an Iowa farmer were suddenly thrown into the same bag and none seemed to really mind it.

Unfortunately for many of us it may be the last time that we will have a minute when all differences seem to have been forgotten and all are united by a common interest. However it did prove that the ideal is possible.

Reduction In Force Slated

A reduction in the civilian employees of the Naval station has been announced by Captain H. Glenzer, Jr., commanding officer.

This reduction in force is effective Sept. 7, and is necessitated due to the sharp cut in station funds for Fiscal year 1970. It is effecting eleven positions.

Captain Glenzer stated that while every effort is being made to effect this reduction through retirements,

those exercising return rights and attrition, it will be necessary to issue a number of reduction in force notices.

The Captain plans to talk with all employees effected and will insure that the adverse effects of the action has been minimized to the fullest.

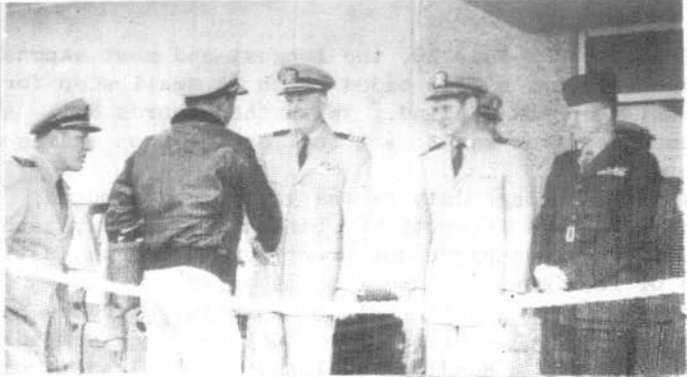
He further stated that his industrial relations office is making every effort to place employees, who will be separated, in other federal

positions throughout Alaska and the lower 48.

The reduction isn't peculiar to Adak. Similar notices have gone out at NAVSTA Kodiak and other west coast commands. Although it is difficult to predict with any degree of accuracy the possibility of further reductions, Captain Glenzer believes that Adak may very well be spared in the future.

First As COMSEVENTEEN

Admiral Visits



Rear Admiral Eugene G. Fairfax, Commandant of the 17th Naval District, was welcomed aboard the U.S. Naval Station Adak on August 3 by Captain Hubert Glenzer, Jr. and a group of officers and dignitaries of the island. This was the first visit of Adm. Fairfax since taking command of COMSEVENTEEN from Rear Admiral Donald M. White, who is now serving with the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense (Administration) as the Deputy Director of Inspection Services. Adm. Fairfax, Capt. Glenzer, and Cdr. Parry made a brief tour of the Naval Station, VP-19 area, NavFac and CommSta.

That evening the admiral was the special guest of honor of the Adak Navy League, at which time he installed the newly elected officers to their posts. Those he installed were:

The following morning Adm. Fairfax awarded the Air Medal to ADJ1 James H. Courson for action while attached to VP-8. Courson is presently attached to VP-19.

Later in the morning Admiral Fairfax presided at the NavFac change of command ceremonies held at the Bering Gym. LCdr. William Kay was relieved upon completion of his tour of duty by LCdr. Rubert Hines, Jr. as commanding officer of the U.S. Naval Facility Adak. Following the ceremonies a reception was held in the Williwaw Lounge.

That afternoon Admiral Fairfax completed his first trip to Adak and returned to his office in Kodiak.



BIZ JASKOVSKY WRITES OF BOOKS, ETAL

The Aleuts believed that light was the life - giving source of all things. They woke early and worked late to take advantage of all the daylight hours. Running water was the source of strength, therefore they bathed daily in the sea. New-born babies were placed in the salt water in any season to assure continual strength.

They felt that any physical misfortune that plagued them caused by blasphemy against the sun, wind or rain.

Knowledge of human anatomy was well developed in the minds of the medicine men, by studying the post mortems of slaves and enemies and from the practice of mummification. They were able to perform adequate surgery and to suture wounds with sinew thread and bone needles. The Aleuts believed that complete fasting without water or food for several days would heal a fresh wound. Food was thought to be harmful at the time they were wounded. Old wounds would be cleaned in warmed oil from the skull of a fox. Deep wounds would be dusted with ground parched teeth and covered with a fresh mouse skin.

Crude lancing and blood-letting were often used as a cure for many disease. Many diseases connected with dirt and filth including syphilis were common among the Aleuts. Large boils and ulcers would cover the backs of most of the villagers. Tuberculosis and liver disorders were common and spread rapidly because they would be left untreated. Apathy towards cure was prevalent among all the people suffering, and preventive measures were unknown at the time. Houses were seldom clean, children were allowed to defecate on the floor and meat was hung out-

side drawing flies until it was used. Poor eyesight resulted from the constant irritation of the smoke in the barrabaras and from the incessant sewing and weaving of baskets in poor light.

Local remedies made from plants were thought to have helped cure the less serious disease. An infusion of yarrow was supposed to cure throat and stomach pain and to help cure colic. Diseased eyes were rinsed in pond scum as a cure. The root of the cow parsnip was sliced and heated and placed over a muscle ache. Iris was boiled and drank as a laxative. The eating of a raw fish was supposed to cut down the irritation of a heartburn. Many other cures were reported for diseases inflicting the Aleuts. Highly developed medicine was a lore among the Aleut medicine men, but their skill in surgery, knowledge of anatomy and familiarity of medicine was a highly guarded secret lost to the present Aleut.

18 Visit 'Unexpectedly

A group of eighteen Alaskan journalists and broadcasters on their way to Amchitka were stranded on Adak Monday night when bad weather at Amchitka forced them to turn back.

Most of the group, representing the major news media in Alaska, took the unexpected opportunity to tour the island and do feature stories.

The group had set out to view the Atomic Energy Commission's Amchitka testing site. The AEC's Public Affairs Officer, Dixon Stewart, said the purpose of the trip was to show AEC precautions to preserve wildlife and avoid noticeable seismic disturbances.

After waiting at Adak for most of Tuesday, the group returned to Anchorage on their chartered Alaskan Airlines jet.

In the group were newsmen

from Associated Press, Reuters, the Anchorage News, the Anchorage Times, two television stations--KENI and KTVA--and four radio stations - - KYAK, KFQD, KHAR, and KSRM.

There were also writers from Alaskan Sportsman and AFN at Elmendorf.

Scott Foster, News Director of KENI, told the Adak Sun, "Aside from the incon-

venience of being stranded without razors and whatnot, we're happy to have a chance to see the island."

Foster and his cameraman, Kenny Dreyer, shot several feet of color film to be used in a special for viewing on Anchorage television.

Tentative plans call for the group to attempt to make Amchitka next week.

Pool Rules 'Cool It'

The Environmental Sanitation Officer has released certain swimming pool regulations which must be adhered to by people using the pool.

He states that a shower must be taken upon entering the pool and bathers who have to leave the pool enclosure must take another shower before reentering.

The Japanese visitors were given a tour of the Naval Station, the tenant Commands and other points on the island Tuesday morning. Most of the crew spent the afternoon bowling.

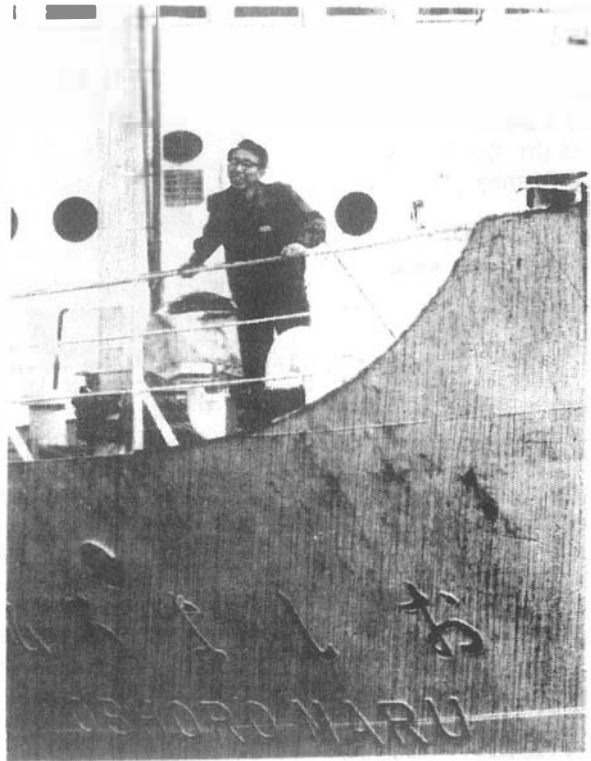

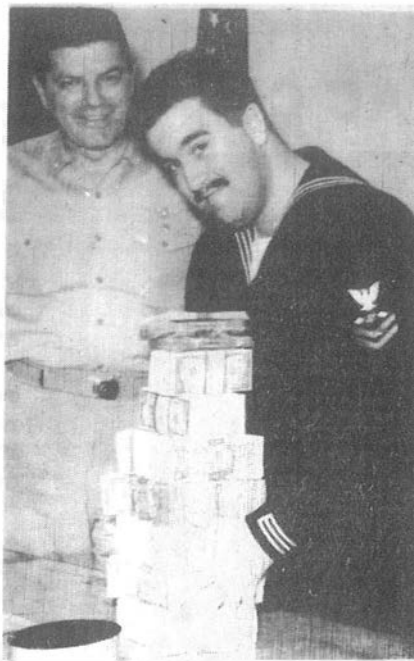

W'Working Shop Sets Hrs

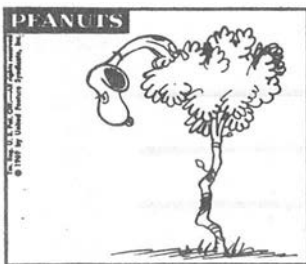
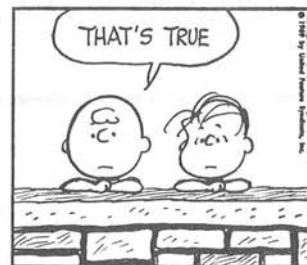
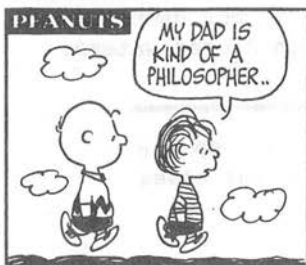
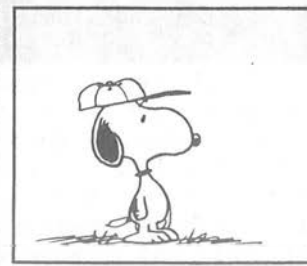
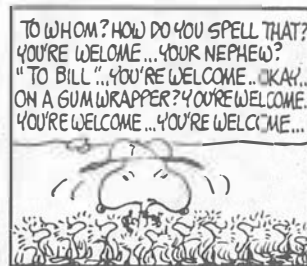
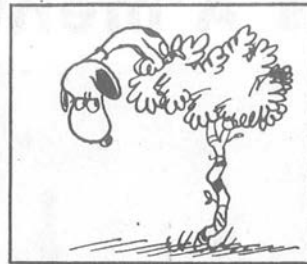
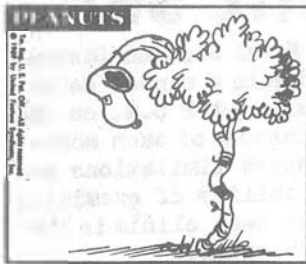
Want to be a "Weekend carpenter?"
