This was the first visit of Adm. Fairfax since taking command of COMSEVENTEEN from Rear Admiral Donald M. White, who is now serving with the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense (Administration) as the Deputy Director of Inspection Services. Adm. Fairfax, Capt. Glenzer, and Cdr. Parry made a brief tour of the Naval Station, VP-19 area, NavFac and CommSta.

That evening the admiral was the special guest of honor of the Adak Navy League, at which time he installed the newly elected officers to their posts. Those he installed were:

Crude lancing and bloodletting were often used as a cure for many disease. Many diseases connected with dirt and filth including syphilis were common among the Aleuts.
